How did you do? To save you time tracking down the correct answers, here they are:

Christianity is the largest religion in the world. Islam is the fastest growing religion in the world (in fact, it will surpass Christianity by the end of this century). And Buddhism can be called the reform movement within Hinduism.

During the season of Lent, I will be hosting a class on Christianity and World Religions in the Library after each Sunday service. I think we could use this class for a couple of reasons.

First, we need to confess that our basic knowledge of other religions is pretty inadequate. While this class will only scratch the surface of each religion, it is a place to start.

Secondly, our Christian faith has a strong call to evangelism; sharing our faith with others. We can only do this effectively in a religiously pluralistic world if we know our points of connection and difference with other faith traditions. While we are to share our faith with others, it is equally important that we be open to learning from other faiths as well.

Today there are many political dimensions to religious practice and acceptance. This class, however, will focus more on comparative religious beliefs. Again, it is a starting point. Lent is a time of faith-reflection and evaluation. As we learn about and appreciate other religious traditions, we can better refine what it is that we ourselves believe about the Christian faith we cherish.

I hope you will join me beginning this Sunday, March 5^{th} .

LENTEN ADULT EDUCATION CLASS CHRISTIANITY AND WORLD RELIGIONS

After worship each Sunday of Lent beginning March 5th.

Join Rev. Dominic in the Library after worship during Lent for a discussion based class that will look at world religions through the lens of our own faith tradition. The classes are not built upon each other so you are welcome to join at any point. The classes will be group discussion based and all are welcome. Each class will begin with a starter video from Adam Hamilton outlining the topic of the day. These will include and Introduction Session on how questions around world religions are framed, followed by sessions on Hinduism, Buddhism, Islam, Judaism, and Christianity.

While Christianity is the largest religion in the world today, there are billions of people who practice other faiths. In this series we will learn the salient features of these other major religions from a Christian perspective in order to lift up points of similarity and difference. Doing so will allow us to better own what it is we believe about our own faith, approach other religions with reverence and respect, and build bridges by learning from other traditions while sharing our own.

SUNDAY SCHOOL:


Toddlers thru 5 will be learning about how to pray. Middle School will continue with the lesson The Power of the Tongue.
